## Recipe: Lemon Meringue Pie

250g shortcrust pastry

2 lemons

250ml cold water

2 tablespoons of cornflour

150g sugar

2 eggs

40g butter

Roll out the pastry and put it into a 20cm round baking dish. Bake in the oven for 20–25 minutes.

Separate the egg yolks from the whites. Put the cornflour and 50g sugar into a bowl. Add a little of the water and mix into a paste.

Grate the lemons and put the grated rind into a pan with the rest of the water. Boil the water and rind, add the cornflour paste and mix well. Heat gently for one minute. Stir all the time. Remove from the heat.


Beat in the egg yolks, juice from the lemons and butter. Pour the mixture into the pastry case.

With an electric mixer, whisk the egg whites in a large bowl until stiff. Add 100g sugar little by little. Spoon the meringue over the lemon mixture. Bake in the oven for 40–45 minutes at 150°C.
